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MoAD Announces Slate of New Fall Programs, Timed to Museum's 20th Anniversary, Nexus Week, and Annual Afropolitan Ball

SAN FRANCISCO, **CA** – This fall, the Museum of the African Diaspora (MoAD) reopens on October 1 with two new exhibitions that celebrate its 20 year history and underline its renewed mission and role in the global art conversation. Timed to the second annual Nexus: SF/Bay Area Black Art Week that culminates with the 2025 Afropolitan Ball, MoAD announces new exhibitions, public programs, and unique community partnerships. Monetta White, Executive Director and CEO of MoAD, said, "The programs we're hosting timed to our 20th anniversary year echo MoAD's renewed commitment to Black art and artists. We envision art of the African Diaspora as central—not peripheral—to the global contemporary arts landscape, and the events we have in store demonstrate the limitless ways we can author new perspectives, worlds, and ways of being together."

Programs tied to *UNBOUND: Art, Blackness & the Universe* curated by **Key Jo Lee** will augment the conceptual rigor of the special exhibition, exploring the cosmic and metaphysical capacities of Blackness through moderated talks, visual meditations, performances, screenings,

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and more. The fall season of programs will kick off on October 1 at 6PM during *UNBOUND's* opening reception with *Irresistibly Alive*, a site-specific performance by exhibition artists **M**. **Carmen Lane** and **Sidra Leigh Bell**. Taking its title from Toni Morrison's call "to be unstoppably, irresistibly alive," the work will summon ancestral presence through movement, voice, and ritual.

Additionally, every second Saturday MoAD hosts **Thrive@MoAD**, a free community day sponsored by Kaiser Permanente, with free admission to all exhibitions. Thrive@MoAD dates for 2025 will be October 11, November 8, and December 13.

Details on Continuum: MoAD Over Time (October 1, 2025 - March 1, 2026)

Alongside *UNBOUND:* Art, Blackness & the Universe, MoAD will open the exhibition **Continuum:** MoAD Over Time in the second floor Salon gallery, which presents archival materials and artworks that honor the museum's twenty-year legacy as a catalyst for Black creativity and culture while charting its expanding role on the world stage.

Organized thematically and chronologically, *Continuum* moves through key eras and ideas in the museum's evolution, tracing a living timeline from its founding to the present and into the future. Visitors will encounter foundational figures, pivotal exhibitions, program milestones, innovations, and visionary leadership moments. This show is designed to celebrate memory and spark reflection, including artists Cheryl Patrice Derricotte, Chester Higgins Jr., JoeSam., Richard Mayhew, Ramekon O'Arwisters, Gordon Parks, Lava Thomas, and Sam Vernon.

Presented by Kumu Māhealani Uchiyama, Pōpoloheno is an unprecedented musical initiative celebrating the often-overlooked contributions of African-descended individuals in post-contact Hawaiian history. Kumu Māhealani will dive deeply into her research and the creation of the song and hula celebrating Betsey Stockton, the very first woman of African descent in Hawai'i. The event will culminate in a short performance.

This transformative project, sponsored by the Gerbode Foundation, and the Kenneth Rainin Foundation, has resulted in an album of original music released in June 2025 and culminated with concert performances in San Francisco and Oʻahu in August 2025.

MoAD's Chief of Curatorial Affairs & Public Programs Key Jo Lee will be in conversation with *UNBOUND* artist Harmonia Rosales to discuss her debut book, *Chronicles of Ori*.

In the book, Rosales retells the African myths she has long treasured, crafting an enthralling epic that spans the birth of the universe to the modern world of colonialism and resistance. She writes of the powerful, temperamental deities called the Orishas; of the founding of Yorubaland by the shrewd leader Oduduwa; of the young heroine Eve, born in a time of violence and despair, who would help her people regain their past splendor; and of shimmering serpents and monstrous shadows who stalk the lands of mortals.

JJJJJerome Ellis (any pronoun) is a disabled Grenadian-Jamaican-American artist, surfer, and person who stutters. The artist works across music, performance, writing, video, and photography. Their debut album, *The Clearing* (2021), was called "an astonishing, must-listen project" (The Guardian). It was co-produced by NNA Tapes and The Poetry Project, and it was released with an accompanying book published by Wendy's Subway.

Musician and visual artist Mark Montgomery French will present an intimate viewing of his ambient protest film, *Thy Navel is a Goblet That Does Not Lack for Wine*, from his album of the same name. This evocative work employs trance-like animations and sensory immersion to explore themes of meditation, resistance, and recovery, reframing Blackness as an origin, an expansion, and a liberation. It sonically draws from across the Diaspora—Javanese gamelan, dub reggae, string quartets, and jazz noir—not just as a style, but as a way to map Blackness across geographies and time.

The evening will conclude with a Q&A with Mark Montgomery French, offering insights into the album's themes and creation.
